**Western Carolina Regional Sewer Authority, Black & Veatch and Clemson Extension
Volunteers Clean Up the Reedy River**

Greenville, S.C. (September 22, 2008) – Western Carolina Regional Sewer Authority employees held their annual Reedy River Clean Up for the 15th consecutive year. The group of volunteers, including employees from Western Carolina Regional Sewer Authority, Black & Veatch and Clemson Extension, spent the afternoon removing trash and debris from the river channel on Western Carolina’s Mauldin Road Wastewater Treatment Plant site at the intersection of I-85 and Mauldin Road. A 1.5-mile section of the Reedy River runs through the property and serves as the receiving stream for the plant’s effluent. The fall workday was scheduled in conjunction with the 2008 South Carolina Beach Sweep/River Sweep week.

This is the 20th year of the South Carolina Beach Sweep/River Sweep, which is organized by the SC Sea Grant Consortium, the SC Department of Natural Resources, and the SCANA Corporation. Last year, more than 6,000 South Carolina volunteers removed over 57 tons of aquatic debris from South Carolina’s waterways. This annual clean up clears our waterways of unsightly debris, educates the public about the impact that aquatic debris has on our economy and our environment, and serves as a research tool for the Center for Marine Conservation in Washington, D.C.

Blake Visin, Western Carolina’s Information Systems Manager, was the organizer of the “Stream Team.” and a hotdog lunch for all volunteers. “Our employees enjoy participating in this semi-annual event,” Visin said. “Our jobs focus on protecting Upstate waterways. And, we feel this clean-up effort is important because it provides us with another opportunity to protect the water quality of the Reedy River.”
